

Professional Dog Groomer

More than 84.6 million American families own one or more dogs. This has created tremendous demand for professional groomers. The groomer's expertise includes careful inspection of the animals, coat clipping, brushing, combing, bathing, nail trimming, eye and ear maintenance, and other aspects of hygiene and grooming aesthetics, all skills that must be taught by professionals. Professional groomers are employed in grooming salons, veterinarians' offices, animal hospitals, kennels and mobile grooming vans. Once the techniques have been learned and the groomer is experienced, he/she may become self-employed, either by offering a house call service or by opening a shop. Dog Grooming School of Pennsylvania is licensed by the Pennsylvania Department of Education and we are members of NDGAA.


